Learnings from the latest BC Tourism and Hospitality Labour Market Information (LMI) Project







We were growing at a steady pace. In 2019, the tourism and hospitality industry employed 348,000 people, up from 296,000 in 2011.





We have always been one of BC's biggest sources of employment. Tourism and hospitality accounts for between 9% and 12% of total employment in each economic region of the province.





We need to stay nimble. Most projections expect employment levels to rebound by 2024, but uncertainty remains due to the pandemic, the strength of pent-up demand and labour supply.





Recovery means more job openings. 2021, the tourism and hospitality industry employed almost 300,000 people; as we recover, job openings - and opportunities - will grow,





Our employees like their work. 72% of tourism and hospitality employees are satisfied with their experience working in our industry.





We lost experienced workers during the pandemic. The largest demographic of decline were workers with ten or more years of experience.





Wages remain on the rise. The overall hourly tourism and hospitality industry wage increased from \$20.80 in 2019 to \$23.50 in 2021.





Half of employers expect staffing to affect future growth. The lifting of pandemic restrictions, and overall growth in tourism, events and travel are also expected to influence growth.



Nearly all employers believe finding new employees will be tough. 97% of employers expect to have difficulty filling positions.





We know what to do next. Together, our industry has mapped out a single Labour Recovery Framework to guide us over the next 2-3 years.
